LEADING UP TO TRAVELLING

	Check your vehicle thoroughly: , check the oil, water, washer fluids, tyres, the floor under the mats and ensure you carry at least one spare wheel. 	Make sure you understand how much weight you can carry, whether that's in relation to your horsebox or how much your car can tow. Check the route beforehand so that you can be certain that all of the roads are suitable for your vehicle. Pack everything you might need, from first aid kits to breakdown equipment.		If you struggle with reversing your trailer, consider a refresher course or install a reversing camera. A camera system can offer peace of mind , as you can see what your horse is getting up to in the back. Ensure that you have the correct driving qualifications to drive your horsebox or tow your trailer.
