Jane is a very experienced, dedicated equine vet with 44 years' experience. Her lifetime interest is equine development and horse welfare, with specialism in young sports horse development and performance. This path of knowledge has resulted in Jane holding chairmanships of numerous prestigious equestrian bodies and today she is Veterinary Adviser to British Breeding, Consultant Vet to the Society of Master Saddlers, Trustee and Chair of the British Horse Foundation, and is the current Chair of the Showing Council.



Sally Iggulden, Chief Executive Officer at Beverley Racecourse

Sally took up the position of Chief Executive at Beverley Racecourse in 2000, having previously worked for the Racecourse Association based at Ascot Racecourse. In 2003, Sally became one of the founders and original Board members of Racing TV. Sally is also a Director of the National Horseracing College, a responsive centre of training excellence within the north, identifying, encouraging and nurturing talent, particularly within young people. Sally is also a avid showing enthusiast and former HOYS winner.



Roly Owers, MA MSc VetMB MRCVS, Chief Executive of World Horse Welfare

Roly is a qualified veterinary surgeon and has been Chief Executive of the charity World Horse Welfare since 2008. He graduated from Cambridge University in 1992 and acquired his Masters degree in Nutrition from the London School of Hygiene and Tropical Medicine in 1997. His previous veterinary roles included the Blue Cross and Royal Army Veterinary Corps.

Roly plays an active role in much of World Horse Welfare's work supporting the horse-human partnership, and as a Director of the British Horse Council he regularly liaises on policy with Defra, the devolved administrations and Ministers. He also advises the International Equestrian Federation (FEI), the International Horse Sports Confederation (IHSC) and the British Horseracing Authority (BHA) on horse Welfare.

Roly is currently Treasurer of the British Equine Veterinary Association (BEVA), Chairman of the UK Equine Disease Coalition, a Director of the British Horse Council, a Board member of the European Horse Network, Chair of the International Coalition for Animal Welfare and Treasurer of the World Federation for Animals.

Bad riding must be addressed, so those that do not understand horse ownership see riding as a positive and not a negative experience for all involved.

Dr Jane Nixon within this webinar, that SEIB are proud to support, describes in detail why correct breeding and early training of any horse or pony is a must, if horses are going to continue through life in harmony and without discomfort. If this academic advice is implemented now, there is a hope that in 20 years' time we will not still be having this debate, horses will continue to be ridden including in competition and the beauty of a well ridden and carefully produced animal is celebrated by the population and not dismissed by so many as unacceptable and harmful.

As horses are domesticated, their welfare must always be our top priority but if they are not ridden would that be to their advantage? We hope you find this webinar enlightening and that we can all work together to ensure horses have a bright future with their human partners.
